More About World Thinking Day

World Thinking Day was first created in 1926 at the fourth Girl Guide/Girl Scout International Conference, held at Girl Scouts of the USA's Camp Edith Macy (now called Edith Macy Conference Center). Conference attendees decided that there should be a special day when Girl Scouts and Girl Guides all around the world think of each other and give thanks and appreciation to their "sister" Girl Guides and Girl Scouts. The delegates chose 22 February as the date for Thinking Day because it was the mutual birthday of Lord Baden-Powell, founder of the Boy Scout and Girl Guide/Scout Movements, and his wife Olave, who served as World Chief Guide.

It is now a tradition that the 10 million Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in 144 countries celebrate this day in international friendship and peace by extending warm wishes to each other across the world. To emphasize the global aspect of Thinking Day, members at the 30th World Conference, held in Ireland in 1999, changed the name to World Thinking Day.

This year, Girl Guides Singapore (GGS) is working with the Singapore Tourism Board on this project to send World Thinking Day greetings to our sisters in Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting internationally and to promote Singapore. Members and staff of GGS are encouraged to join the mass writing and sending of Project Postcards on 6 November 2007 to members of the international Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting community.

More About Girl Guiding in Singapore

Girl Guides Singapore (GGS) is a Uniformed Youth Organisation (UYO) and is part of a worldwide movement of 10 Million members in 144 countries, with a mission "to enable girls and young women to develop their fullest potential as responsible citizens of the world". The World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) is one of six of the largest international youth organisations that form the "Alliance of Youth Chief Executives" which collaborates on policy issues affecting young people. WAGGGS has a vision for 2011 - to be "a growing worldwide Movement - the voice of girls and young women who influence issues they care about and build a better world".

Girl Guiding is open to all girls and women without any distinction of race, creed, nationality or any other circumstance. It is a game of adventure, observation, knowledge and ideas. The aim is to provide girls and young women with the opportunity for self-training in the development of character, in the realisation of responsible citizenship and promotion of service to the community.

To maintain a high ethical standard based on the aims and principles embodied in the "Promise and Law" as laid down by the Founder, Lord Baden-Powell, and to encourage international goodwill and understanding by establishing friendly relations with girls of other nations.

Started in 1917, GGS has a proud heritage, a fine record of achievement and a long tradition of providing a high quality non-formal educational programme that is dynamic, flexible and values-based training in life skills, leadership and decision making. Our unique 5-Point Programme, which caters to the holistic development of girls and young women, emphasising Personal and Social Development, Home, Outdoors, Community and International, has reached thousands of girls and young women; engaging and
